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Livermore Valley Opera Hosts Guest Lecture Thomas Holliday, Authorized Biographer of Composer Carlisle Floyd

LIVERMORE, CALIF. – The Tri-Valley's own professional opera company, Livermore Valley Opera (LVO), is thrilled to host a special guest lecture by Thomas Holliday, the authorized biographer of American composer, Carlisle Floyd, on September 14 at 7pm at the Bothwell Arts Center in Livermore. Seating is limited, advance reservations are requested (info@LVOpera.com) and tickets will be \$10 each at the door.

Holliday will share with the LVO community some fascinating details about the composer, known as "Father of American Opera," and speak about his book entitled *Falling Up: The Days and Nights of Carlisle* Floyd (Syracuse University Press, 2013). A limited number of Holliday's books will also be on hand for sale at \$30 per copy. This author's guest appearance also promises to offer unique insights into and a preview of LVO's own upcoming production *OF MICE AND MEN*.

About the Author

(*Syracuse Post-Standard*) With a background in both instrumental (brass) and vocal music, trained as a stage director and operatic bass-baritone at Indiana University's School of Music, Holliday has been active as a stage director of opera in both Europe and the United States. His directing work includes engagements with the Hamburg State Opera (Germany), and the Stadttheater Klagenfurt and American Institute of Musical Studies in Austria. His American assignments include productions for Indianapolis Opera, Pennsylvania Opera Theatre, Glimmerglass Opera Theater, Opera Colorado, Central City Opera, Baton Rouge Opera, Berkshire Opera Company, Shreveport Opera, Sacramento Opera, Bronx Opera Company, and the Ash Lawn Festival in Virginia, where he was Director of Productions for three seasons. His repertoire extends to more than fifty fully-staged operas, operettas and musical comedies, in more than seven languages, many in multiple productions.

Holliday finds himself increasingly devoted to writing: fourteen supertitle translations, articles for Lyric Opera of Chicago's *Season Companion* study guide, and *The Opera Journal;* twenty-four performing English translations of operas; two original opera librettos; and unpublished fiction, poetry, and settings of dozens of art song texts. He is currently at work on an historical thriller series, *The Counterfactual Mozart*.

His well-received *Falling Up: The Days and Nights of Carlisle Floyd* (Syracuse University Press, 2013) is the authorized biography of America's greatest and most prolific opera composer. *Tempo* (Jan 2014)) credited the volume as "a heroic story of a truly remarkable individual, told in meticulous detail by an author whose sympathy and understanding derive from his own experience of his subject's field...Floyd's operatic themes run through the wider spectrum of humanity, in accessible musical language, and we are shown how his operas have not only legs, but now wings, showing up in all parts of the globe. A thoroughly enjoyable and informative book...stamped with resounding authority and undoubted affection."

About Carlisle Floyd

The late irreplaceable Carlisle Floyd was a man who spoke brilliantly and elegantly, always in shapely, completely-formed sentences, about most anything—including himself. Carlisle was the quintessential renaissance artist: composer, librettist, writer of poetry, fiction, and essay; painter, virtuoso pianist, and master teacher. It was Thomas Holliday's great honor to be asked by him in 2006 to embark upon his authorized biography, published in 2013.

Floyd's skills as a mentor were at least as great as the musical and dramatic components of his gift. Regardless of the specialties of his individual collaborators—generations of great singers, conductors, stage directors, students of all stripes; and at least one writer—he dispensed the rarest amalgam of truth and tact. His criticism was invariably subtle but cutting to the core, delivered with the tact, kindness, and generosity that inspired growth—the hallmark of the greatest teachers.

His two most-performed works are *Susannah* (1955); and *Of Mice and Men* (1970), the meat of LVO's current season. Replete as both are with gorgeous, singer- and audience-friendly lyricism, his dramatic sense alternately caresses and knockout-punches. His operas are guideposts to an artistic synthesis, especially when inspired by great literature. His grand vision, coupled to the ability to realize it, was for a new hybrid American form of musical theater, that speaks, unfiltered, to audiences of all sizes, shapes, and consistencies. Carlisle was and will continue to be a great opener of the human heart.
